



# Auburn, Massachusetts

# Dear People of Saint Joseph Parish,

A couple of weeks ago I wrote that I would be going on retreat with the priests of the Diocese of Worcester at the Notre Dame Spirituality Center at Ipswich, MA. I was on retreat from May 12 – 17 with over twenty priests. The retreat master was Father Dennis McManus, no relation to our bishop, who gave a number of presentations to us. It was a very fruitful time for all of us there, together in prayer, meditation, liturgy, and recreation.

Father McManus is a great story teller. He illustrated all his points with stories about the Fathers of the Church, saints, and his own experience. The major thrust of his presentations was Jesus' relationships with other people. He focused on the conversations that Jesus had in the Gospels and our interpretation of the conversations.

Father has numerous collegial relationships with a number of rabbis. He sits on a number of organizations that deal with Jewish – Catholic dialog. He told us that we have to read the Gospels in light of the atmosphere they were created in order to

get a better understanding of what was going on. Jesus was a Jew who grew up in a Hebrew society. The early Church had an influential Jewish heritage that still affects us today. The Apostles were Jewish. Much of the early Church was Jewish too. The Gospels were created in a Jewish milieu and the early Church was familiar with the Jewish undertones present in the Gospels.

We began with the study of Mary and Joseph. Joseph, our patron, was a good practicing Jew from the evidence presented in the Gospel. He had a conservative character toward the observance of the law. He took his role as a protector of Mary and Jesus quite seriously. He passed this characteristic on to Jesus who grew up in his home. Mary was also serious in her practice of the Jewish faith. Like many women in her society, she was compassionate and focused on the raising of her child. We can see that she passed these characteristics onto Jesus as he conversed with the people he met throughout his work.

What was important to Jews in Jesus' society? Tradition says it all. The Torah, Moses' Law, was very important. Liturgical celebration had great value. Prayer was an important part of daily activity. But Jesus also discarded some social boundaries. He spoke to the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well. He touched the dead son of the widow of Nain. He did healings on the Sabbath.

The Rabbi, Father McManus commented, would easily identify the event of Jesus being in the Temple at twelve years old as his Bar Mitzvah. He was asking and answering questions in the company of Jewish men, in his Father's house.

The Jewish perspective of Jesus' conversations with people demonstrates his respect and affection for the people with whom he is speaking. The Gospels show that Jesus is in control of the conversations and brings out God's love for his people in every instance.

The retreat presentations confirmed much of what I understood to be contained in the Gospels. I was able to learn from Father McManus and I appreciated what he brought to us, especially in his illustrations. I hope it will have a very positive impact on you as well.



# Vianney Dinner


The next Vianney dinner is Thursday, June 13 at the Holy Name of Jesus House of Studies at 51 Illinois St.,


