

Dear People of Saint Joseph Parish,

It is that time of the year when we remember Easter again. The Easter lilies from former years are now in bloom around the church. The floral trumpets that visually sounded "*Alleluia*" in years gone by are now in season in our region. They give us the opportunity to remember Easter and the Resurrection that Jesus celebrated and the promised resurrection for all of us on the last day.

Along with the Easter lilies, the orange daylilies also remind us of the trumpeted "*Alleluia*." They are in the bed along the walkway between the church and the parking lot. Their intrusion over the walk is a reminder of God's beautiful creation that is difficult to ignore.

It seems that the Asian lilies that graced the ramp leading into the church for many years have gone away. I noticed a disturbance in the soil where the bulbs were located in the early spring. My estimate is that a local varmint made a meal out of the bulbs. I hope that the varmint was not of the two-legged variety who dug the bulbs up and planted them elsewhere. Those lilies had been there before I arrived at St. Joseph Parish. I may plant new bulbs there later in the season.



The hydrangea bushes are blooming with magnificent flowers this year. Remember that the hydrangea on the parish property were also the plants that graced the altar at Easter in years gone by. I notice that when the weather is severe during the winter, going below zero degrees for an extended period, the tips of the hydrangea freeze and wilt. The mild winter temperatures that lasted throughout the last winter did not freeze or wilt the tips. Those tips have become buds that are waiting to bloom during this summer. The bush that I have at my home has turned a beautiful blue with flowers. The flowers are not the huge pompoms that usually grace the bush, but the smaller flowers this year cover the bush and leave little room for the sun to grace the green leaves below.

The hydrangea last for the rest of the summer. The flowers will be on the plants until the early frost. I hope that you enjoy the brilliant colors they contribute to the church grounds.

I have pepper, tomato, cucumber, and rosemary plants on the deck behind the rectory. I anticipate that they will provide me with some food during this growing season.

The parish center is also witness to floral display. The Rose of Sharon usually bloom near the statue of Saint Joseph on the slope. It is still too early for them to show their flowers, but it won't be long until they do.

Daisies are gracing the rectory flower beds. So are the hostas. I put down some columbine seeds there, but they are not coming up. I put some cosmos seeds down and we will see them produce flowers soon.

Please enjoy the flora on the parish grounds. May they always remind you of God's beautiful creation.

Feast of St. Thomas, Apostle: July 3

There is very little about the apostle Thomas in the Gospels; one text calls him the "twin." Rarely during Jesus' lifetime does he stand out among his colleagues. There is the instance before the raising of Lazarus, when Jesus was still in Perea and Thomas exclaimed: "Let us also go and die with Him." Best-known is his expression of unbelief after the Savior's death, giving rise to the phrase "doubting Thomas." Nevertheless, the Gospel passage describing the incident must be numbered among the most touching in Sacred Scripture.

In the Breviary lessons Pope St. Gregory the Great makes the following reflections: "Thomas' unbelief has benefited our faith more than the belief of the other disciples; it is because he attained faith through physical touch that we are confirmed in the faith beyond all doubt. Indeed, the Lord permitted the apostle to doubt after the resurrection; but He did not abandon him in doubt. By his doubt and by his touching the sacred wounds the apostle became a witness to the truth of the resurrection. Thomas touched and cried out: My Lord and my God! And Jesus said



to him: Because you have seen Me, Thomas, you have believed. Now if Thomas saw and touched the Savior, why did Jesus say: Because you have seen Me, Thomas, you have believed? Because he saw something other than what he believed. For no mortal man can see divinity. Thomas saw the Man Christ and acknowledged His divinity with the words: My Lord and my God. Faith therefore followed upon seeing."

Concerning later events in the apostle's life very meager information exists. The Martyrology has this: "At Calamina (near Madras in India) the martyrdom of the apostle Thomas—he announced the Gospel to the Parthians, and finally came to India. After he had converted numerous tribes to Christianity, he was pierced with lances at the king's command." —Excerpted from *The Church's Year of Grace*, Pius Parsch
