

Dear People of Saint Joseph Parish,

The Church will celebrate a Holy Year Jubilee in 2025. Preparations are being made for the Church's celebration. It is a special year of grace for God's people as we gather together in prayer.

The tradition goes back to ancient Jewish practice. During a Sabbatical Year it was a time of rest and recuperation. People prepared for the Sabbatical Year in the previous years by stockpiling food and supplies. Fields were left fallow during the year. It was the ancient conservation method for the farms to regenerate the soil. Whatever grew in the fields was plowed under the soil after the growing season. It rejuvenated the fields so they would grow a better crop after the Sabbatical Year.

It was a time of prayer. As the soil was nourished, so was the soul. Every Sabbath was a time of prayer and meditation. The Sabbatical Year placed emphasis on spiritual renewal through prayer and meditation.



It was a time of forgiveness. The Sabbatical Year encouraged people to tear up promissory notes and debts. It was a time to lay down arms and sue for peace among nations, tribes, and families. It was the great opportunity to free slaves and indentured servants. It was a time to let hurts go and seek healing. You may remember that Pope Francis called an extraordinary Holy Year about ten years ago. It was a

Holy Year of Mercy. A relic of that Holy Year is posted above the door to the reconciliation room in the church. The focus of that year was mercy.

Jubilee 2025 has the theme of "Pilgrims of Hope." The Holy Father sees great signs of despair among people because they are poor, sick, elderly, the young, imprisoned, and migrants. While the Jubilee will not change their state of poverty, illness, age, incarceration, or migration, the Jubilee focuses on hope that changes the heart and spirit. Pope Francis reminds us that hope is a virtue that is joined with faith and charity.

Holy Year pilgrims will go to Rome to celebrate the Jubilee. Travel agents are already hard at work preparing travel packages and accommodations for pilgrims. Rome is sprucing itself up in preparation for millions of pilgrims to visit. Most pilgrims will want to visit the four major basilicas in Rome that will have special Holy Doors opened for the celebration. You may wish to be one of those pilgrims. The city will be crowded throughout the Holy Year.

During the Extraordinary Jubilee Year Pope Francis directed bishops to designate doorways in churches in their diocese that would participate in that celebration. It will not be so next year. Pope Francis directed bishops to designate their cathedral, or any other suitable gathering site to be a place of pilgrimage in each diocese because everyone will not be able to travel to Rome.

Please remember the basic part of the observance: rest, prayer and meditation, mercy and forgiveness, and hope!

The month of August is dedicated to the Immaculate Heart. Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. The month of August is traditionally dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The physical heart of Mary is venerated (and not adored as the Sacred Heart of Jesus is) because it is united to her person and is the seat of her love (especially for her divine Son), virtue, and inner life. Such devotion is an incentive to a similar love and virtue.

This devotion has received new emphasis from the visions given to Lucy Dos Santos, oldest of the visionaries of Fatima, in her convent in Tuy, in Spain, in 1925 and 1926. In the visions Our Lady asked for the practice of the Five First Saturdays to help make amends for the offenses committed against her heart by blasphemies and ingratitude. The practice parallels the devotion of the Nine First Fridays in honor of the Sacred Heart.

On October 31, 1942, Pope Pius XII made a solemn Act of Consecration of the Church and the whole world to the Immaculate Heart. Let us remember this devotion year-round, but particularly through the month of August.

Prayer for Evangelization Revitalization of Parishes in the Worcester Diocese





