Dear People of Saint Joseph Parish,

Church tradition dedicates October as the month of the Holy Rosary. Catholics have prayed the rosary for centuries and the rosary continues to contribute to the spirituality in the Church even today.

Early monks used to use knotted or beaded strings to keep their place in prayer. Middle eastern peoples used knotted or beaded strings to keep count of many things. To use a beaded string in a monastic setting was just an extension of a usual secular custom.

Monks eventually shared the practice with laypeople who wished to join their prayers with the monastic communities. While the monks usually recited the psalms, lay people



would adapt their common prayers to the practice since printed scriptures were very expensive and most laypeople could not read. Lay people could easily memorize the Creed, Lord's Prayer, Hail Mary, and the Trinitarian Doxology that make up the prayers on the beads of a rosary. Many different arrangements were practiced among the faithful people depending upon the nearby monastic community.

Saint Dominic and the Order of Preachers were instrumental in the popularizing of praying the rosary. Saint Dominic claimed to receive a vision of Our Lady of the Rosary who instructed him to pray the rosary and encourage others to do the same.

The rosary employs different levels of prayer that all Christians can pray. The repeated recitation of biblical texts brings calm and rhythm to the prayer. All the prayers on the rosary give glory to God and incorporate the veneration of Mary in the process. The mysteries of each decade provide material for meditation upon the life and work of Jesus in the Gospel and the celebration of Mary's participation in God's plan of salvation. Praying the rosary can bring the Christian to contemplation with an open spirit to do God's will.

The traditional rosary had 150 beads for the Hail Mary. It was a reflection of the 150 psalms in the psalter. Pope John Paul II expanded the mysteries to include the Luminous Mysteries that we can celebrate today.

Some people have expanded their observance of the rosary with additional prayers. The Fatima Prayer is one common addition. Others add the Memorare, Hail Holy Queen, the Miraculous Medal Prayer, the Prayer to Saint Michael, or other local tradition.

I pray the rosary. It is part of the way that I raise my mind and heart to God. I encourage the parishioners to do the same. You do not have to do all the mysteries at once. Some people do a decade every day. Others pray a chaplet, five decades, every day. You may adopt the practice that serves you and your communication with God best.



My dear friends in Christ,

In his message for World Mission Day 2024, Pope Francis shared the following: "the Risen Lord remains close to his missionary disciples and walks beside them, particularly when they feel disoriented, discouraged, fearful of the mystery of iniquity that surrounds them and seeks to



overwhelm them. So, 'let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of hope!' (Evangelii Gaudium, 86). The Lord is greater than all our problems, above all if we encounter them in our mission of proclaiming the Gospel to the world. For in the end, this mission is his and we are nothing more than his humble co-workers, 'useless servants'(cf. Lk 17:10)."


The second to the last weekend of October is celebrated as World Mission Sunday around the world. Our diocese joins with the worldwide church in supporting the work of the Holy Father through the various missionary societies.

The Holy Father continues, "I desire to express my closeness in Christ to all the men and women missionaries in the world, especially to those enduring any kind of hardship. Dear friends, the Risen Lord is always with you. He sees your generosity and the sacrifices you are making for the mission of evangelization in distant lands."
