Dear People of Saint Joseph Parish,



The Fourth Sunday of Advent lights the last Advent candle on the wreath. When all the candles are lit, we know that the time is near for Christmas. The candles glow brightly, each at a different height. The first has burned the longest and is now the shortest. The last candle to light is still the tallest of the four.

The Advent wreath is displayed on a horizontal plane. It is arranged as such to support the candles placed upon it. In some large churches, the wreath is suspended from the ceiling. The faithful gather beneath it and look up to see the candles burning. Baroque churches usually have a heavenly vision painted on the ceiling. When people

look through the wreath and see the heavenly vision painted on the ceiling, the wreath becomes a place of focus. It is through the mystery of the coming of Christ that opens the way to salvation and eternal life.

The Advent wreath becomes the Christmas wreath. Candles are removed and the Christmas wreath is placed on the wall vertically. The evergreen boughs remind us of everlasting life. Green is the liturgical color that reminds us of the virtue of hope. The red ribbon reminds us of the blood of Christ that was shed upon the cross.

Holly may be on the Christmas wreath. The evergreen leaves and red berries blend in well. Holly is a thorny bush. It reminds us of the crown of thorns. Nuts and berries may be on the wreath. They were the last crop to be harvested and

y be on the wreath. They were the last crop to be harvested and placing them on the wreath reminds us of the goodness of God. Pine cones that carry seeds remind us of rebirth and new life.

Christmas comes to us this week. We sing of a "Silent night, holy night" when Jesus was born. Joseph and Mary received him. Wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid

him in the manger. The angels sang, "Glory to God in the highest." Shepherds were the first to visit and carry the news of the child to Bethlehem and the region.

Let us receive the same Christ when we celebrate Christmas. Jesus, the Son of God, comes to us. May we welcome him with great joy. May his grace shine in us. May his goodness guide our actions. May we share his love with friends and family. May our parish shine with God's glory. Merry Christmas! Christ is born in us.



Fourth Sunday of Advent

A Christmas Message from Bishop McManus ...

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

On Christmas Eve, Pope Francis will open and enter the Holy Door of Saint Peter's Basilica to celebrate Christmas Mass and begin a Jubilee Year.

A Jubilee Year is a special time of remission of sin and punishment due to sin. It involves pilgrimages, prayer, and works of mercy and penance. Jubilee Years awaken in us a profound awareness of the depth of God's love, mercy and solicitude for each one of us. That deepened awareness leads to a greater hope of sharing in the glory of God (Romans 5:2).

At Christmas, the glory of God briefly shone down on quaking shepherds tending their flocks as angels announced good news of great joy: God's Eternal Son was born of the Virgin Mary. Through the Holy Spirit, He took on our lowly humanity that we might forever share in the glory of His divinity. As Jesus was fully God and fully man, no one can claim that God is distant from us, or unaware of our trials. He walked among us and died for us. He is that close. He cares that much. This



gives us hope throughout life and in every circumstance of life. Pope Francis has called us "Pilgrims of Hope" as the theme for this year's Jubilee. It is a hope that will not disappoint because it is based in Jesus Christ who is the Eternal Word of God made flesh.

The New Year 2025 is not only a Jubilee Year, but an anniversary year. It is the 1900th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, which defined the dogma of the divinity of Jesus Christ as true God and true man. It is also the 75th Anniversary of the founding of the Diocese of Worcester, for which we give thanks. 2025 will be a year full of opportunities for grace, hope and joy. They all stem from the Son of God and Son of Mary who was born in Bethlehem. I pray that you and your loved ones will have a blessed Christmas and that the observances and celebrations of 2025 will prolong those joys, deepen your faith and strengthen your hope.
